# Looking Back on 2007

When 2007 began, Servants for Haiti set some very ambitious goals. They were published in the Winter 2007 edition of our newsletter. A year has come and gone and it's time to take a look back at how things are coming along. Here is a recap of that list, along with a brief update on our progress in each area:

## 1.Fund 100% of the orphanage programs: food, medical and caregivers.

While we haven't reached the 100% mark yet, we are very close. We need a couple of children sponsored for food and six more for medical care.

## 2.Build the play area for the orphanage.

The play area is now under construction. It's just a matter of time before the kids will be climbing all over it! Look for photos in a future edition.

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# Looking Ahead to 2008

SFH wants to build on the momentum we have coming out of 2007 to do more in 2008. Already we've added programs to feed CJRA school children who aren't sponsored and pay more overhead costs at the orphanage. (See descriptions of these programs on page 4.) We also plan to send more teams this year. Finally, we want to continue to expand our base of donations and volunteers so we can help more children. Watch the newsletter and web site for more details on these and other initiatives.

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## 3. Hook up the new stove in orphanage.

## 4.Expand the school sponsorship program to allow more kids to be fed and educated.

At the end of 2007, we had 87 students sponsored. We need a lot more to be supported, but this is a great start.

# 5.Send our first work team. (Our first planned trip in November 2006 was canceled due to unsafe conditions.)

We are very excited to have sent two successful teams in 2007. This is a huge milestone for SFH. The team members did construction at the school and interacted with the children in the orphanage.

# 6.Find new financial resources to grow all our programs and support new opportunities to assist the children of Kingdom Kids orphanage.

We expanded our contributions base significantly, holding our first fundraiser and receiving funds from several new sources, including a corporate grant.

### 7. New, improved web site

The new web site has been up and running for a while. It looks great! Check it out.

On top of all this, we increased our income by \$25,000 in 2007! That's a lot of meals, books, medicine and care for the children of Haiti!

It's been a great year. Children are being fed, cared for and educated *today* because of your generosity. On behalf of the children of Haiti, thank you!

### Trip Report - November 2007

Our November team returned home from Haiti still overflowing with the excitement of the trip, ready to share memories of bucket-passing, seeing old friends, playing with children and seeing first hand the difference Servants for Haiti is making. (They also brought with them one of our partners in Haiti, Madame Milio, the director of the food program at the CJRA school. (See the article on page 4 for more about her visit.)

Here is a report from that trip. These are the words of a first time visitor to Haiti, Jeremy, a college Junior:

Going to Haiti was one of the best experiences of my life. I went there knowing only maybe 4 people out of the entire group of 16 but by the end I felt like I fit right in.

Before I came I did not really have many expectations. I was just excited to be serving God and the people of Haiti. The entire week was amazing. While the work may not have been that complex I definitely learned so much from the kids that were helping us out. I was taken back by the willingness of all the Haitians to want to serve us, especially because we came to serve them. I was really impressed with the younger kids, and how much they wanted to help out. So I would for sure say that I learned a lot from the Haitians as far

as what it means to take joy in service, and to take joy in work that others might view as tedious.

There's a lot to talk about so I will try to keep it short, but another thing that I love was working with the children in the medical clinic. The thing that amazed me the most about that was that kids who were 3 or 4 were coming in to seek medical attention because they knew they were sick. I found myself comparing these kids to 3 and 4 year olds in the U.S. and the difference in independence is huge.

The last thing that stuck with me a lot was how quickly I had become attached to so many of my new friends especially all the kids we stayed with at the orphanage. I miss waking up and walking down stairs and hearing them call my name and asking me to dance.

And also, I was amazed at how much Haitians just love life. At the place I work at right now there are so many people who have everything they could ever want and are still not happy. However the people of Haiti have a fraction of a fraction of what we have here and they are still the happiest people I have met. It really challenged me to think about how much I take things for granted and how much I can learn from them.

None of these children had ever seen swings prior to our June team taking them here. At first they were very nervous. November was only second trip the playground, but by then they were old pros!

Start thinking about joining us next fall. The weather is great in November and school is in full swing!

### Two New Feeding Programs

Servants for Haiti has initiated two new ways to fill the gaps in our current sponsorship programs.

### **CJRA Feeding Program**

At the CJRA school, children who are not sponsored must pay for their meals in order to be fed at the school. Most cannot afford it. Some go without while their sponsored friends eat. This is also a hardship for the people working in the kitchen. They are forced to turn away hungry children who cannot pay, while others can eat.

This is especially painful if one child in a family is sponsored and another isn't. The director of the feeding program said, "I cannot tell one sibling, yes, you can eat and the other, no, you can't. How could I do that? I just borrow money to try and feed all the children. It is very hard."

## Feeding Program at Kingdom Kids Orphanage

At the orphanage, the current sponsorship program only covers the food for the sponsored children. It does not take into account overhead costs such as water, electricity, charcoal and the other items needed to prepare the food.
